"...But those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint..." - Isaiah 40:31 NIV

#### Welcome to our new Rector

The Rev Marcus Hart, curate of Christ Church, Ware, Hertfordshire, has been appointed rector of the Parish of Skerry, Rathcavan and Newtowncrommelin.

He is married to Jude and they have a three-yearold daughter and six-month-old son. The couple are both originally from Northern Ireland. Jude is from Ballymena, while Marcus grew up in Lisburn.



He has a BEng in Civil Engineering from Queen's University Belfast, graduating in 2015. He obtained a PGCE in Secondary Mathematics with Qualified Teacher Status in 2016 and studied a BA in Theology at St Mellitus College from 2019-2022.

He was an intern for Scripture Union NI from 2014-2015; a ministry apprentice in St Mark's Church, Battersea Rise, London, for a year from September 2015; and taught Mathematics in Thames Christian School, London, from 2016-2019.

As an Ordinand, Marcus worked in St Mark's, Battersea Rise, before his appointment as curate in Christ Church, Ware, in July 2022. Over the years, he has volunteered as a rugby coach, Scripture Union camp leader and church youth leader, and has also volunteered on mission trips to Zambia and Tanzania.

In his spare time, Marcus enjoys rugby – though admits that these days he mostly watches the game – fitness, hiking, cold water swimming and travel, but especially enjoys time with his wife and children.

Marcus explained why he was drawn to the role of rector in Skerry, Rathcavan and Newtowncrommelin. "St Patrick's is a church that is embedded in its community and seeks to reach those outside the Church and to grow those who are inside it," he said. "I hope to bring a heart that is passionate for Jesus, that encourages those in St Patrick's to grow in their relationship with him and enables them to



live that faith out. Jude and I cannot wait to meet everyone and start forming relationships with the whole church."

A date for the Service of Institution in Broughshane will be advised in due course.

#### The Dandelion

I asked in the shop for weed killer. "...So, you, too, have dandelions..." responded the assistant immediately. It seems that many had been wanting to kill the dandelions. They get everywhere is a common call – a real blight on gardens and countryside.

Hold on. What about that blaze of colour that stands out against the fresh green grass. That vivid yellow that is such a sign of spring. Can we not rejoice in that splash of colour? And those beautifully formed florets with the five fused petals – a work of art. And can our pet bunnies not enjoy those leaves? Indeed, the new leaves can added to a salad not to mention the dandelion tea or wine that can be made – free of charge.

Historically the humble dandelion has also been used for medicinal purposes. How many of us also when we were young liked to take those resulting fluff balls with all their seeds and supposedly tell the time by blowing on the ball? Yes, the humble dandelion, or from the French, dent de lion – the lion's tooth – depicting the shape of the leaf – part of God's creation with its part to play in the grand scheme of things.

Maybe Jesus could have said, instead of talking about lilies, "...consider the dandelions of the field..." and proceeded to draw some teaching from this part of nature. Imagine creation that was just black and white – no colour. Well, the dandelion reminds us of the beautiful colourful creation of which we are part. You find dandelions hard to pull up – that is because they have very long roots. Deep rooted – that is what we need to be – deep rooted in Jesus, held firm by him. Notice how those dandelions are so very strong – they can even push up through tarmac.

With God strengthening us we can push up through all sorts of difficulties. And the fluff balls with all those seeds to be spread everywhere – are we not to spread the good news of Jesus wherever we find ourselves.

So, the dandelion not so much our enemy as our friend – there to teach us some lessons for life.






