### A prayer for the New Rector and Parishioners.




Almighty God, who calls us to serve you with faith and love, we ask for your blessing on our new Rector.

#### **Haircut**

There I was, sitting in the barber's shop. It was one where you did not make a booking but just waited your turn. Not a classy joint – rather more earthy. You can be addressed by the staff as 'mate'. Anyway, I was sitting patiently when the thought suddenly entered my mind – did Jesus often get a haircut?



Isn't it strange that perhaps the best-known person the world has ever known, and we know absolutely nothing about his physical characteristics including his hair. Most speculative images portray him with long hair. Did this need to be cut and, if so, who did it? Presumably it needed to be washed. During the three year ministry period did the disciples cut each other's hair, or maybe one of them was cut out for the job

Hair does feature in the Bible. Samson lost all his strength when Delilah cut off his hair while he was sleeping. Evidently, King Absolum had a great head of hair: whenever he cut it the weight of it was 5 lbs! There are two stories of women putting ointment on the feet of Jesus and wiping them with their hair – quite shocking to most, and yet Jesus seemed quite at ease with this. Paul ventured in writing to the Corinthians that long hair was a disgrace to a man but to a woman it was to her glory. On the other hand, women were not to braid their hair and Peter agreed! Jesus affirmed how much God was concerned for each of us by declaring that the very hairs of our head are all numbered.

Many of us like to keep our hair in order and pay considerable attention to it. What about Jesus? One imagines he would have given it little concern but maybe he did have a favourite hair style. These thoughts may seem a bit unusual but perhaps they bring into focus a very important fact about Jesus. He was fully human and completely shared in our humanity – he had hair that he had to deal with just like anyone else! This humanity gives us hope as he truly understands all that we go through in life and as well as being there with us he has provided the means of healing our humanity or redeeming it.

Back to the barber. I listened to all the banter, the gossip that flowed freely and was amazed at some of the intimate talk I heard. Then I was in the chair and asked "How's things going; what are you doing today?" I'm not sure what to share – do I declare to all in sundry that I will be writing a sermon! I muttered something inconsequential. Yet Jesus, one senses, would have been quite at ease in such a setting and, somehow, have made a good impression. In our daily living, in all the contexts that we find ourselves how can we make a Christlike impression?






