The Rector writes.....

There is much excitement with the prospect of different COVID vaccines, and with them comes hope for an end to the pandemic - even with a second lockdown in place. Since March, COVID has blighted our community, impacting on every level of our lives, but there is hope for restoration.

The vaccine gives hope for the end of a disease and restoration of the world. It seems entirely appropriate that hope come as we enter Advent: a time of hope, as we prepare to celebrate Jesus' first coming. We look forward to his return, and, with Him, the end, not only of this disease, but all diseases. His return will see not only restoration of the world, but the perfecting of the world: John looks forward to it in Revelation 21 verses 3 to 5: "...Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away. He who was seated on the throne said, "I am making everything new"...!"

Advent beckons us to this hope, drawing our eyes towards a greater world than the one we live in, with its sickness and death. COVID has brought our society face-to-face with its mortality, but in the midst of this disease, we look forward in hope to a new world, where death, mourning, crying or pain are no more. This is the new world that Jesus promises us when he returns.

This advent hope appears in a rhyme in the C.S. Lewis' book The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe, where Beaver says: "...Wrong will be right when Aslan comes into sight, at the sound of his roar, sorrows will be no more, when he bares his teeth, winter meets its death, and when he shakes his mane, we shall have spring again...".

As we look forward to a vaccine that will remove this disease, let us fix our eyes on the one who would end all disease and death, as he not only restores the world, but also perfects it with his coming: "...let us fix our eyes on Jesus...". (Hebrews 12:2)



St Patrick's (Broughshane) Mothers' Union 1950 – 2020

We are an international Christian membership movement, active in 84 countries, supporting families and communities in need of support in the UK and worldwide since 1876.

Just like other organisations, Mothers' Union members have been unable to meet since the beginning of March. However we were delighted that the branch was able to hold a service in October: wonderful to be able to share in prayer and look forward to when we can resume our monthly meetings with a cup of tea and a chat.

In October a service of thanksgiving and commissioning was held in All Saints Church, Antrim. Trustees and Executive members were joined by Bishop George and June Butler, All Ireland President, in a service which was streamed live to those who were unable to attend. Hilary Boddy, from St Patrick's, was commissioned in her new role as Diocesan Prayer Representative: we wish her well in her new post.

The Trustees and Executive have been meeting regularly via Zoom and to mark what should have been a time when Diocesan Council meets the President, Sally Cotter. She recorded a video message which can be found on the Connor Mothers' Union website.

All members should have received a Prayer Diary produced for the '16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence' campaign, and a prayer diary for 2021. If anyone has not received copies, please get in touch with Allison or Cathy.

The '16 Days Against Gender Violence' campaign runs from 25th November to 10th December We would encourage everyone to link-in to the programme of online events which can be accessed via the Connor Mothers' Union Facebook page, or www.connormothersunion.org

This year Mothers' Union is holding a 'Global Day of Action' on the 5th December, centred around the disturbing statistic that '1 in 3 women worldwide have experienced domestic or sexual abuse' and that Mothers' Union, as a leading women's organisation, believes this to be unacceptable.



The main events are as follows (exact times have yet to be confirmed);


Online Morning Prayer: 25th November









Thursday 17th December at 7.30pm



We started back in September 'online', looking at what we enjoyed in the past few months and what we would

like to do. We chose to do the Skill Builders Take Action and Express Myself.



We became inventors, coming up with new ideas to help us in our life, coming up with some fantastic inventions from recycling robots to jet packs to get to school and work. We also explored dance moves, making up our own dance routines!

We made an 'impact-o-meter', looking at our impact on planet Earth. For one week, we did something to help the environment with recycling and using less energy. 
