The Rector writes.....

In November the Church had its 'Mind Matters' conference, looking at mental health. As a Church family, we have partnered with Inspire Wellbeing (www.inspirewellbeing.org). It may be an odd way to open a Winter, or, more precisely, a Christmas letter from the Rector. Still, in this world filled with anxiety and depression, a world grappling with mental health, the Christmas message offers us the hope of a God who knows what it means to be human in all our struggles. John encapsulates it beautifully with those famous words:

"...The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us..."

John speaks of the Creator and Sustainer of all things, taking on the fullness of the human experience, warts and all. The author of the Epistle to the Hebrews presents the Incarnation as Jesus as being able to "...empathise with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are....". In the words of Glenn Scrivener, the Christmas message is:

"...This God in the Manger uproots all our notions:

A heavenly stooping, divine demotion.

Born in a stable, wriggling on straw,

Fully committed to life in the raw...".

This brings me back to the issue of mental health, because, in Jesus, we have a God who knows our struggles, including our anxiety and mental anguish. He feels the range of human emotions from love to loss and abandonment. In the Garden of Gethsemane, he sweated like droplets of blood, showing extreme stress and anxiety. Here is a God who knows all our struggles and what it means to be human.

Often, we can be carried away with the romance of Christmas - a babe in a manger, all very sanitised - but I want to suggest to you that the Christmas message is hard-hitting and challenges our notions of God. It means God is drawing near and sharing our world with all its beauty and hardships, including mental health.

Crash Helmet

"... That wee man on his bicycle..." is how I have often been known. I have cycled all my life, so when I came north after ordination my bicycle came with me. I got to know my first parish cycling around the Rathcoole Estate at the height of the troubles. When I moved to East Belfast, I was at home cycling around the city and then when I became Rector of Eglantine I was in and out to Lisburn. For many years my bike and I were a familiar sight around Ballymena. However, when I made regular trips to Nepal, I always hired a bike and loved cycling amidst the chaotic traffic in Kathmandu.

For most of my cycling life I never wore a crash helmet, simply because such things were not considered necessary – a bit like when seat belts were not considered necessary in cars. Then things changed, but I was a bit slow off the mark. My family remedied that, presenting me with a crash helmet one Christmas. Thankfully, I was not too 'dyed in the wool' to take the hint. It made sense, so I started wearing it and have done so ever since. In fact, I would feel very strange if I did not have it on my head.

I often cycle to services of worship and clearly the crash helmet accompanies me. Now, while I have sometimes entered church and forgotten that I am still wearing by bicycle clips, I am not aware of ever going in still wearing my crash helmet. Yet, maybe I should!

I wear my crash helmet when I am cycling because you never know what might happen when you are out on the roads. Should I not wear it in church because you never know what might happen in worship. And no – I am not thinking of getting beaten up by fellow parishioners! When we come to worship, we come to honour God and to meet the living God.

Could we expect that anything might happen? Maybe God might turn us upside down, maybe God might shake us, maybe he might lift us up. God wants to transform us and sometimes God may wish to change us in dramatic ways. Of course, we can approach worship expecting nothing to happen. Yet, can we encounter the living God and be unmoved?

Maybe we could issue crash helmets as we enter church as a reminder that this worship could be transformative!




St Patrick's Mothers' Union

RISE UP Against Domestic Abuse is Mothers' Union's new campaign to raise awareness about domestic abuse. The letters of RISE UP stand for Respond, Inform, Support, Empower, Unite and Pray.

Our aim is to make sure that activism against domestic abuse and gender-based violence happens 365 days a year and not just

during the 16 Days of Activism campaign in November and December.

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone from any walk of life, even the educated, the affluent, both women and men. Abuse can and does happen anywhere. Unfortunately, some abusers use the Bible to justify their actions and abused people often feel they should stay with an abusive partner.

We want to raise awareness that this not OK. In St Patrick's Mothers' Union, we will take part in the RISE UP challenge and aim to bring about change. We hope to complete the Bronze award by the end of 2023.

Congratulations to Melanie Sloan who was ordained Deacon on 3rd September in St Anne's Cathedral.






Shona Bell was also ordained Deacon at the same service to serve in Holy Trinity, Ballywillan.


Melanie's son, Finn, was appointed a junior organ scholar in St Anne's Cathedral on 2nd October, though he still plays from time to time in Broughshane.




We were delighted that six of our Explorers have been selected to join forty eight others from Slemish District, who hope to complete their Gold and Silver expeditions by canoeing

new Brownies and they are all thriving. We also had some girls make their Brownie


Promise. They all did so well!


